REPORT

OF THE

COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT.



THE Managing Committee of Cork-street Hospital, in presenting their Annual Report and financial statement, have pleasure in informing their subscribers and the public that they believe every department of the institution is in an efficient state.

The additions to the principal hospital building, known as the New House, alluded to in the last Report as being then in progress, have since been completed, and have been found to add to the comfort of the patients, the convenience of the nurses, and to improve the sanitary condition of the hospital.

The four large and well-ventilated wards in the building hitherto known as the Convalescent House, have been lately appropriated to epidemic cases, it being intended in future to allot the Old Mouse to the convalescents, thus insuring the complete isolation of epidemic and convalescent cases. This change has been found very beneficial during a late outbreak of scarlatina, when there were in these wards a great many cases of this disease under treatment at one time.

Some alterations have been made in the nursing arrangements by shortening the time each nurse is on continuous duty, which will tend to greater efficiency in this department by insuring more unintermittent attention to the patients.

There has been a marked decrease in the number of patients admitted to the hospital during the past year—viz., 653 against 858 in the previous year. Notwithstanding this fact, the expenditure has again exceeded the income. This deficiency has been caused by heavy expenditure necessarily incurred in the completion of the improvements already alluded to, the thorough re-painting of the woodwork of the building, and the needful renewing of some of the furniture, none of which items are of annual recurrence.

The Committee may also again remind their subscribers that in such an Institution as this it is needful to maintain at all times a full staff specially trained for attendance on fever cases, a temporary reduction of which would entail serious consequences when any sudden emergency arose. The wisdom of this policy was apparent lately, when twenty cases of scarlatina were admitted within a few days.

Another cause of the chronic difficulty felt by hospital boards in keeping the expenditure within the income is that few subscribers have increased their subscriptions in proportion to the enhanced value of all articles of consumption and the increase in salaries and wages.

In conclusion, the Committee refer you for further information to the Report of their medical officer annexed, and confidently appeal to their fellow-citizens to continue their pecuniary support on such a scale as will enable them not only to maintain the efficiency of the hospital, but to carry out some further improvements which are still necessary to render it complete, and fully able to bear comparison with similar institutions in other cities.

MEDICAL REPORT.

THE year ending the 31st of March, 1876, has not been characterized in Dublin by the prevalence of any so called zymotic disease, with the exception of its last month. Of forty-six cases of scarlatina, admitted during the year, one half came under treatment during March the last month of our hospital year.

In many cases procrastination has proved fatal to the sick without giving them the opportunity of receiving the benefit of medical treatment in the well ventilated and comfortable wards of the hospital. On turning to the analysis of the mortality, during 1875-6, it will be found that one case of scarlatina was sent to the hospital in a dying state, surviving its admission only five hours, the friends of the patient having allowed fourteen days of illness to elapse before seeking hospital assistance. Two other cases of the same contagious disease died within two days of admission.

A case of bronchitis was sent in a dying condition, living but fifteen hours after admission.

A case of typhus that bad been three weeks ill died within sixteen hours after entering the hospital.

Another case of typhus died in thirty-six hours after reaching the hospital on the twenty-second day of illness.

Typhus carried off one patient on the sixteenth day of fever that had been but two days in hospital.

One case of pneumonia died within eighteen hours after admission, on the eleventh day of the attack.

Two cases of the same disease proved fatal on the tenth and sixth days respectively of the disorder, within twenty-four hours after admission.

Another case of inflammation of the lungs died on the eighth day, within twenty-three hours after admission.

Two cases of bronchitis, one of enteric fever and one of puerperal fever, all died within forty-eight hours after admission—each of these cases having lain at home ill for several days before seeking removal to the hospital.

Of the 56 deaths that occurred during the year, 18 or nearly our-third were admitted when past medical treatment.

Of the above, 7 had a duration in hospital not exceeding 24 hours.

Of the above, 9 had a duration in hospital not exceeding 48 hours.

Between 0 and 14 days ill before admission, 8 were admitted.

Between 14 and 31 days ill before admission, 6 were admitted.

Three other cases died—one on the second, another on the third, and another five days after admission, although they had been ill for several days previously.

Delay in sending cases requiring admission to a fever hospital is dangerous, not only to the patient but also to the relatives and neighbours of the sick. The object of the Institution is not only

curative as regards the sick person, but preventive in reference to his neighbours.

Thus of the fifty-six deaths that occurred during the year, eighteen or nearly one-third were admitted when practically past medical treatment, and no less than seven died within twenty-four hours, and nine within forty-eight hours after admission.

While the benevolent objects of the founders of Cork-street Fever Hospital and House of Recovery render the establishment of inestimable value to the community by not refusing admission to any case of fever, no matter how hopeless, and so tending to check the spread of the most contagious diseases amid the poor of the population, who from their habits, poverty, and surroundings, are eminently calculated to become the vehicles for the transmission of disease to persons in other spheres of life. The fact of receiving all cases of the most fatal forms of fever, even in its most advanced stages, renders the rate of mortality in the hospital necessarily high.

Thus if the utility of a fever hospital is to be gauged by a reference to the rate of mortality, most fallacious ideas will be held. This matter will be clearly understood by reference to the tables drawn up with great care by the Resident Medical Officer, Dr. Atkins.

A large number of persons yearly seek admission to the hospital when suffering from alcoholism, and as will be seen by the accompanying summary of cases, several are admitted when circumstances lead to the belief that they may be complicated with fever.

The year 1875 has been marked by a registered death-rate of 27 per 1,000 inhabitants, instead of the average of 26.4, which was that registered during the previous ten years in Dublin.

Considering that there was not any zymotic disease epidemic during the year, the mortality was very severe, and this was owing to the prevalence and severity of diseases of the respiratory organs; heart disease was also more fatal than in the year 1874. The mortality from disease of the organs of respiration was no less than 28 per cent. over the average for the preceding ten years. It is not, therefore, a matter of surprise that of the admissions to Corkstreet, as many persons died of those diseases as of typhus and enteric fever together.

That diseases of the lungs and air passages should prove so fatal, will be readily understood by those who are aware of the extremely dilapidated state of many of the tenement houses of Dublin.

On referring to the Meteorological Abstract, given above, for which I am indebted to Dr. J. W. Moore, one of the Assistant Physicians of the Hospital, it will be seen that 1875 was a year of average temperature, with minfall and rainy days above the average.

⁺ The rainfall is recorded daily at Pam.

[#] A "Rainy Day" is one on which at least '01 inch of rain falls.

⁵ The Mean Temperature calculated from the maximal and minimal readings of the Thermometer by Kaamta's Formula was 49-30.

In April, 1875-6, the first month of the hospital year, three persons died of typhus; all were males, their ages being 40, 25, and 16 years, respectively.

Bronchitis, broncho-pneumonia, phthisis, and scarlatina, caused each one death in the same month.

In May, two deaths were due to bronchitis, and one to each of the following diseases:—Meningitis, relapsing fever, and pneumonia.

It will be seen by reference to the accompanying table, that in the month of January the deaths in the hospital numbered ten; in April seven deaths occurred; and in March six. Pneumonia caused eight deaths in the four warmest months—viz., June, July, August, and September; whereas in the remaining colder months. October, November, December, January, February, March, and April, but four deaths were attributed to this disease.
