THE COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT.

In presenting the Eighty-fifth Annual Report of the Cork-street Fever Hospital and House of Recovery to the Governors and Subscribers, the Managing Committee have again to report on a comparatively uneventful year in the history of the institution.

There have been an unusual number of admissions of Enteric Fever during the past year; the other forms of fever usually treated in this hospital have been under the average in number.

The Managing Committee have during the past year provided a residence for their nurses in a building separate from the hospital, consisting of comfortable and airy bedrooms, bath accommodation, and a day room for their use at dinner-time and during their off-duty hours.

It has been found necessary to renew the windows in a portion of the Fever-house, and an opportunity was thus afforded to improve the mode of ventilation: which change, together with the erection of a porch at the entrance door, enables the house to be kept at a more even temperature than heretofore, which is an important factor in the treatment of acute cases.

During the past year, the Managing Committee have expended considerable sums in painting and sanitary improvements, needful for the maintenance of all departments in proper order and repair.

Their Senior Physician, Dr. William Stoker, having served the hospital for seven years as Permanent Physican, and being thus disqualified for re-election, has been succeeded by Dr. Gunn, one

of the Temporary Physicians, and Dr. Cosgrave has been elected to the vacant post of Temporary Physician. Dr. Stoker's entire connection with the hospital extended over eleven years, and the Managing Committee desire, in expressing regret at the termination of his connection with the hospital, to testify to his efficient services, and his constant desire to promote the well-being of the institution, both by personal attention, and by valuable suggestions to the Managing Committee.

Dr. Joynt was re-elected for a second year to the position of Assistant Registrar and Resident Medical Officer.

During the past year the hospital has received £2,000, being a second instalment of the legacy from the late Mr. William Bannon; also a legacy of £500 from the late Mr. Denis Crofton, which sums have been duly invested in accordance with the rules of the institution. The Ouzel Gallery Society having been dissolved, and having decided to divide their accumulated funds amongst some of the charities of Dublin, this hospital received from it a donation of £394 7s. Od., which sum has been invested. Under the will of the late Mr. Hugh Blayney, the hospital has become entitled to an annual payment from certain dividends of £55. A special donation of £100 has also been received from Sir E. Cecil Guinness, Bart.

It is with feelings of deep regret that the Managing Committee have to record the loss which the institution has sustained by the death of their late valued colleague, Mr. Richard Perrin, who had been for twenty-seven years a member of the board, and who had during that long period unremittingly and zealously given his services to the institution; he was seldom absent from the weekly meetings of the Managing Committee, except when ill or away from home, and he never lost an opportunity of promoting the interests of the hospital.

Messrs. J. J. Digges La Touche, and Marcus Goodbody, J.P., were elected as members of the Managing Committee, at the Annual

The Managing Committee believe the institution has never been in a more efficient state for carrying on its work, and trust that its friends and supporters will continue that pecuniary support which is so necessary, and which has never been withheld from Corkstreet Fever Hospital by the citizens of Dublin.

MEDICAL REPORT, 1888-9.

The record of the hospital year, just past, shows a marked decrease in the number of admissions—571 as against 951 in the year previous. This decrease is altogether attributable to the lessened prevalence of Scarlatina and Measles, and the almost complete disappearance of Rötheln, of which there had been no fewer than 137 cases in 1887-'88.

The good results of improved sanitation continue to manifest themselves in the reduction of the number of Typhus cases; but the causes, alike in civil and military practice, making Typhoid endemic in Dublin are less under control, and the number of cases of the latter fever treated during the year reached 99, as against 62 in the previous record. Almost all the institutions near or in Dublin have freely availed themselves of the resources of the house in the treatment of fever cases.

The proportional number of serious cases has been greatly increased during the past year by the absence of Rötheln, in which the death-rate is very low, and the very large number of cases sent in dying. That it is better that such patients should be, even although late, transferred to hospital, is but too amply proven from the awful results know to have followed from "wakes" held in the crowded fever dens of our city. Yet the risk involved to numbers of lives from the too tardy removal of such cases, is greatly to be deplored, and the increased death-rate which results bears hardly on the institution which receives them. There should now be no hesitation in sending a case suspected to be fever into hospital, even before the development of symptoms renders a diagnosis assured, as the observation wards give the patient sufficient security.

The medical staff feel keenly the great loss the hospital has sustained in Mr. Perrin's death. To a full knowledge of the requirements of hospital management he added a readiness to receive appreciatively and weigh candidly every suggestion offered, which

commanded the respect of the medical staff, who in every emergency found that they could implicitly rely on his warm aid and kindly judgment.

Dr. Day has compiled for me the tables appended with praise-worthy accuracy, and I have to thank him and Dr. Joynt for the assiduous attention devoted to the patients.

Miss Richards has fully maintained the character of the hospital for careful and kindly nursing.
