R E P O R T
OF
THE COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT.

IN presenting the Eighty-seventh Annual Report of Cork-street Fever Hospital and House of Recovery to the Governors and Subscribers, the Managing Committee are glad to be able to report favourably as regards the efficiency of the institution, and the continued care taken to keep it in a state ready to meet any emergency.

There has been no special outbreak of any epidemic in fever to mark the past year, so that the daily number of patients in the Hospital has been low; but the public must always bear in mind that a Fever Hospital such as this must be, like a Fire Brigade, in its readiness to meet any emergency that may arise within its scope, and, whether its wards are full or empty, the staff must be there with wards, beds, and material, prepared, at a moment's notice, to cope with any outbreak of infectious disease that may arise; and experience has shown how suddenly such an outbreak may occur, and to what an extent it may spread, if the materials are not at hand to meet it at once.

The Managing Committee are gradually improving the buildings of the Hospital, from year to year, as their funds admit. During the past year they have had the boundary wall substantially repaired with concrete, the kitchen floored with granolithic cement, the gate at the last lodge re-hung, and the building of the lodge itself remodelled, besides many other small works.

The Managing Committee have had to take into their consideration, since their previous Report, the whole question of the payment and the treatment of their Nursing staff, and have felt themselves obliged to increase substantially its rate of wages, and to make such regulations regarding it as will lighten the Nurses' work and, the Committee trust, increase their efficiency and their content with the Hospital. The higher education that nursing now requires, has resulted in a superior class of women devoting themselves to this calling, with the inevitable consequence, that the better class naturally demands a higher rate of pay, and, as the supply is not yet equal to the demand, they get it.

The Committee have been anxious to bring the Nurses employed in the Hospital into connection with some scheme, by which pensions could be secured for them to form a provision for their old age, but no feasible plan has as yet occurred to them. It is a matter they will keep before them, and they hope to be in a position to meet the difficulty before very long.

Arrangements have been made with the City of Dublin Nursing Institution, by which Cork-street Hospital receives Probationers for a three months' course of instruction in fever nursing, and so far they have worked in a satisfactory manner.

The Managing Committee are glad to be able to report that the misunderstanding with the South Dublin Union has been arranged.

Dr. J. Marshall Day, the Resident Medical Officer and Registrar, has been seriously ill from typhus fever contracted in discharge of his duty, and has had to go away for a short period to recover his health.

Dr. William Dawson has been appointed Assistant-Registrar in the room of Dr. Newcomen, whose year of office had expired.

£148 has been received during the year on foot of the late Mr. William Bannon's legacy.

The Lady Superintendent is always very pleased to receive donations of warm clothing for those leaving the Hospital, as well as contributions of fruit, flowers, toys, and books or pictures of a suitable nature, for the use of the patients.

MEDICAL REPORT, 1889-90.

THE accompanying tables show that there has been a decrease of 269 patients admitted to the Hospital in the last year, as against the year before. This is due to the absence of any extensive epidemic, the stamping out of Typhus through the energetic action of the Sanitary Officers of the Corporation, and the custom of treating Enteric in the wards of general hospitals.

Looking back over reports of this hospital in years gone by it will be seen that many of the cases of Typhus came from houses which have been removed and replaced by healthy Artisans' Dwellings, from which cases of fever are now very rarely received into the Hospital. The close connection between this disease and unsanitary conditions was strikingly illustrated last autumn, when a house not far from the Hospital containing four rooms, in each of which a family lived, through a change of ownership of neighbouring premises was cut off from all sanitary accommodation. In a short time Typhus broke out and eleven cases were admitted into this Hospital, directly traceable to the one house, and I believe more cases were admitted to other hospitals. Fortunately all the cases treated in this Hospital recovered. I think it is to be regretted that Enteric is so frequently treated in the wards of general hospitals, as there is considerable risk of the patients receiving improper articles of food from their fellow patients who are ignorant of the danger convalescents from this disease run from the slightest error in diet, and also because the patients must suffer from seeing their fellow convalescents enjoying a liberal diet whilst they must be still restricted.

About the usual proportion of "hopeless" cases were sent into the hospital during the past year. I think it would be well if the general practitioners in the city would realize the great boon which has been conferred on the sick poor by the establishment of the Jubilee District Nursing Institution. Many cases that are quite unfit for removal can now be tended by the skilled nurses sent by this Institution into the homes of the poor, and many a life saved,

which, in former days, would have been lost by the exposure to cold during removal to hospital. This applies especially to Pneumonia.

I regret that during the past year Dr. Day, a Probationer from the Baggot Street Nursing Institution, and one of the domestic servants employed in the hospital contracted Typhus. They all recovered. It must be a matter of congratulation to the Managing Committee, that so perfect are the sanitary arrangements of the hospital that Enteric Fever has not been contracted by any one of the large resident staff for several years past.

The Visiting Physicians have during the past year received valuable support from Doctors Day and Newcomen, Resident Medical Officers, and from Miss Richards, the Lady Superintendent. The discipline of the hospital has been admirably maintained.
