REPORT

OF

THE COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT.

THE Managing Committee in presenting their Ninety-fourth Annual Report to the Governors and Subscribers of Cork-street Fever Hospital and House of Recovery, call attention to the fact that the epidemic of Scarlet Fever has remained throughout the whole of the past year, and has caused the strain on the resources and working of the Hospital to be continued.

During the same year no less than 1,984 cases have been admitted to the Hospital and a daily average of 165.80 beds filled. If we turn to Table No. 7 of the Dublin Hospital Sunday Fund for 1897, showing the average of work done in the various Dublin Hospitals for the past three years, it will be found that the number of patients admitted to Cork-street (1,984) is higher than any other Hospital in Dublin save the Rotunda, whilst the daily average of beds occupied (165.80) exceeds any Hospital in the city. The public should bear this in mind when arranging their subscription lists for the year, as the Hospital is often passed over because being in an out of the way part of the city it is seldom seen, and being a Fever Hospital it is never visited.

The Beneaven Convalescent Home shows 387 patients admitted in the course of the year and a daily average of 23.38 beds occupied. Of these patients most of them came from Cork-street, 38 only having been sent from elsewhere, but as the Home at the outside is not available for more than 30 beds it is as well there was not a greater rush on it.

The place and site has fulfilled the utmost expectations of the Managing Committee so far, and the Home has been worked with wonderfully little friction, and even that little will be lessened now that the Telephone has put it in immediate connection with the Hospital

From the increased quantity of water required for baths, &c., the well has had to be deepened and an oil engine erected to work the pump. Advantage was taken of the engine to furnish the place with electric light, which has improved its sanitation, cleanliness, and freedom from risk by fire.

The Managing Committee regret to have to report that 96 cases of Diphtheria were admitted during the year.

The Managing Committee having found that their experienced staff nurses were gradually leaving them, tempted by higher rates elsewhere, were obliged to increase their wages in every case by a substantial yearly sum.

The house, No. 109, Cork-street, has been taken on for another year, as it has been found most useful for the accommodation of the nurses.

Towards the latter end of the financial year, the numbers under treatment having diminished, the Committee found itself in a position to send out to Unions and Private Homes a few of their disengaged nurses. Application had often been made previously to them to do this, but their own demands upon their nurses were so great that they were unable hitherto to spare one. The nurses sent out have given great satisfaction, and it must be admitted that in Fever cases no nurses have the same experience as our own.

The Fever House has had the old plastering hacked off and replaced by fine Parian cement, and the whole house has been painted.

A new range of the most improved type has been put in the general kitchen and a like one in the kitchen of the Recovery House.

The Board-room has been painted and the furniture varnished, not before it was required.

The Managing Committee has been strengthened by the appointment of Mr. Arthur Perry as a member thereof.

No legacies were received during the past year.

Miss Hampson, the Lady Superintendent, having been appointed to a better post in London, Miss Carson Rae, the Assistant Lady Superintendent, has been appointed in her place, and Miss M. L. Watson elected to the post of Assistant Lady Superintendent.

Dr. J. J. Kinsella has been appointed Assistant Registrar.

The Committee regret to say that they are in debt to their Bankers to the amount of £3,502 5s. 4d.

MEDICAL REPORT, 1897-98.

THERE has been a very heavy demand on the resources of the Hospital during the year ending the 31st March, 1898; the total number of cases admitted to the Hospital and treated to a conclusion amounted to 1,984. This number, though showing a decrease of 684 from the previous year (due to the gradual dying out of Measles and Rotheln), is still much above the average since the years of the Small-pox Epidemic. The numbers have been kept up chiefly by the admissions from Enteric Fever and Scarlatina, 262 and 708 respectively, showing an increase of Enteric and a steady continuance of Scarlatina. The reception of a large number of Diphtheria cases, 96 in all, taxed the isolation resources of the Hospital severely, as the new Building had practically to be given up to the treatment of this disease alone, but I am happy to say that the proper isolation of the various infectious diseases in separate wards, or even Houses, as the nature of the cases demanded, has been steadily managed by the Resident Physician.

The death rate for the year on the entire number of cases was slightly above that of any previous year since that of 88-89, being 11.21 per cent. However, deducting the cases sent in hopeless or dying on admission, the rate is only 9.32, a certainly low death rate when it is taken into consideration that many of the patients were the weak ill-nourished children of the very poorest class. In the opinion of the Visiting Staff the very satisfactory low death rate for several years past is very largely due to the great ability, and the untiring zeal in the care of the patients displayed by the Resident Physician, Dr. John Marshall Day.

The admissions from Enteric Fever were 37 more than those of the previous year; a very much greater number than usual of young people seem to have contracted the disease, as 15 cases under 5 years of age were admitted, and the large proportion of 83, out of the 262, were between the ages of 5 and 15 years. The death rate at this latter period was only from 4 to 5 per cent. The total of 262 cases is in excess of any year for the last ten.

The cases of Pneumonia were many of them of a severe type, and were in excess by 29 over those of last year. An examination of the table will show that the greatest mortality was as usual between the ages of 40 and 60 years.

The result of the treatment of the 100 cases of Erysipelas establishes, I think, a record, as not one of the 36 male patients died, and only 4 out of the 64 females admitted.

The admissions from Scarlatina during the year still maintained an alarmingly high rate, 708 cases having been received and treated. The death rate under 5 years of age in both sexes was severe. In some of the cases, Diphtheria appeared concurrently or as a complication.

The Epidemics of Measles and Rotheln of the years before gradually died out, and there is not at present a case in the Hospital of either disease.

Last year 28 cases of Diphtheria were admitted with nine deaths, showing a death rate of 32·14. This year the numbers were—96 admitted, 26 died—death rate 27·08.

On analysis of Table XIII. we find that more females than males were admitted, the numbers being 55 to 41; we also find the death rate of cases under five years of age was 46.66, and over that age 9.80.

Sixteen of the cases died within twelve hours of admission, and eleven of these died within six hours. If we exclude these cases as not being subjected to the antitoxin treatment, we find the death rate with antitoxin was 27.08, being a decline of 5 per cent as compared with last year.

Now if we analyse the death rate of those admitted early, and those admitted late in the disease, we find a decided difference :--

19 were admitted, being 1 day ill, all recovered.

Eight were admitted, the duration of the disease was not elicited; of these four died.

One point must be noticed, that is, that patients admitted five, six, or seven days ill are chiefly older children, amongst whom the death rate is generally lower; for instance, of the ten admitted five days ill only two were under five years of age.

The mode of death in most cases was either laryngeal stenosis, pulmonary complication or pyremia; only two cases died from cardiac paralysis; in fact, paralytic symptoms were less frequent, and milder than previous years.

In no case did any abscess form after injection of antitoxin; in two cases a red rash formed, and in some cases which were injected in the abdominal walls, diarrhox followed.

Although, in some cases, 3,000 units were used, we cannot attribute any bad results to such large doses.

The presence of Staphyllo and Streptococci with Klebs Loffler bacilli always denoted a severe type of disease.

Several cases of Scarlatina were complicated with Diphtheria; they were brought early under the influence of antitoxin, and as a rule did well.

We noted that deaths from Cardiac Paralysis after convalescence set in, were not observed in cases treated with antitoxin, which fact is contrary to our experience of former years.

In conclusion, we may justly hope that if the disease be early diagnosed and rapidly brought under antitoxin treatment, the death rate will show a further decline.

Unfortunately, it is a most insidious disease, which frequently does not come under treatment till laryngeal stenosis or grave pulmonary complications have arisen.

The Convalescent Home, Beneavin, has been of the greatest use in assisting the accommodation of the Hospital, to say nothing of the immense benefit it has been in building up the strength of the patients before returning to their homes; the large number of 387 were admitted

there as Convalescents during the year (including 38 private cases). It would seem that as the advantages of the Home become more widely known, it will be largely availed of by the General Public in order to get infectious Convalescent Cases quickly out of their private houses.

The Nursing of the Institution has been carefully and efficiently carried out during the year by the large staff of nurses, under the able and sympathetic supervision of the Lady Superintendent, Miss Carson Rae. A new feature of the Nursing Department has been instituted, and now nurses, specially skilled by long training in the care of Fever patients, can be supplied to nurse patients in their own homes.
