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REPORT

OF THE

MANAGING COMMITTEE, 1900-1901.

ALTHOUGH the Managing Committee is only presenting its Ninety-seventh Annual Report to the Governors and Subscribers, it is right to call attention to the fact that this is the Centenary year of the Hospital's existence.

The Cork Street Fever Hospital and House of Recovery had its origin at a meeting of a few citizens of Dublin, held on the 28th of October, 1801.

The following is a copy of the record made of the day's proceedings, and the names of the Founders of the Institution:—

"HOUSE OF RECOVERY, OCTOBER, 1801.

"As no adequate hospital accommodation has hitherto been provided for the relief of the sick poor of Dublin, afflicted with fever (especially such as may be of a contagious nature), and as it has been found by experience that every exertion heretofore made for the relief of persons labouring under the above disorders at their own houses has, in a great measure, failed in producing the wished for effect. The establishment of a House of Recovery, to which patients on the first appearance of fever might be removed, has, therefore, been long considered as an institution much wanting, and peculiarly calculated to alleviate the complicated miseries suffered by the poor from the prevalence of contagious disease; and it having been intimated by Government that they were disposed to assist such an undertaking, a subscription was immediately entered into, a proposal containing the outlines of such plan as was most likely to meet with general approbation, and a

statement of the aid that might be required, signed by four of the subscribers, laid before Government, and the sum of £1,375 2s. 6d. having been subscribed, the subscribers were summoned to meet on 28th October, 1801, at the Royal Exchange, when the following persons attended:—

"A copy of the proposal above-mentioned was laid before the meeting.

"Ordered that said proposal be entered upon the journals."

Mixed motives, namely—Christian charity and the instinct of self-preservation led to the establishment of this hospital, for the dual objects of relieving the sufferings of the sick poor, and of affording some means of checking the spread of fever and other infectious diseases which claimed their victims from the wealthiest as well as from the most indigent classes. The benevolent men who started the movement appealed to the Government of the day and also to the wealthy citizens of Dublin, and they succeeded in obtaining, not only an Annual Government Grant, but also large sums in cash and by legacies, which enabled them to found and carry on this hospital.

It is interesting to take note of the progress which has been made during the past century as regards public arrangements for providing for the needs of the sick poor. In early days the care of the sick and the alleviation of the sufferings incident to poverty and illness were in this country entirely left to individual private benevolence. It was not until the year 1838 that the Irish Poor Law was enacted, and only by still later legislation was it made obligatory on the Boards of Guardians to provide hospital accommodation for the sick poor suffering from infectious diseases. For about twenty years past, the North and South Dublin Unions

have paid the Cork Street Hospital a Capitation Rate for patients sent in from their districts in excess of the number of free beds provided for by the general funds of the hospital; but since the passing of the Local Government Act the South Dublin Union have declined to pay for any patients except those from the Union Workhouse, holding that the recent legislation relieved them from the duty of providing hospital accommodation for the sick poor, and placed the responsibility for such on the Urban Authority. The Sanitary Authority of the City not having undertaken this duty, the Managing Committee have been obliged to continue to curtail their admissions, even when they had empty beds, as they could not overdraw their bank account to an indefinite amount. As a matter of fact, with the reduced amount of work done during the past year, their expenditure has again exceeded their income to the extent of nearly £1,000. It is, therefore, undeniable that from the want of sufficient financial support, while there were empty beds in Cork Street Hospital, numbers of patients remained in their own homes suffering from infectious diseases, a state of affairs not conducive to the recovery of the sick nor to the prevention of the spread of these dangerous diseases.

The Committee wish to draw public attention to the omission in the Local Government Act of any provision to make it compulsory on some public body to provide hospital accommodation for the sick poor of the city.

In the Report issued by the Managing Committee last year, allusion was made to the epidemic of scarlatina, which was stated to have existed for three years previously. On referring, however, to the statistics of the hospital, it will be found that this disease has actually been epidemic in the City of Dublin for the last seven years, although it had not attained to its greatest virulence until the year 1898-99. It has since considerably abated, but the Committee regret to state that the extent of its prevalence has not by any means been reduced to its endemic proportions. In the years 1891 and 1892 scarlatina had nearly disappeared from Dublin, as it also did in the years 1882 and 1883. In the interval between these dates, another epidemic of scarlatina occurred, although it did not attain to the dimensions of that of 1898-99.

It is an important question for the Public Health Authorities of the City and suburbs to consider why, after an immunity from this disease had been so nearly attained, its greatest prevalence should exist contemporaneously with the supposed improvement of the general sanitary condition of the city, and why it has now apparently obtained an extensive and permanent hold on the population of the city.

During the year ended 31st March, 1901, 1,769 patients were admitted into the Hospital, with a daily average of 130.83 beds occupied, as large an amount of work having been done as the financial resources of the Hospital would admit. It is much to be regretted that sufficient money was not forthcoming to accomplish all the work that might have been done.

The admissions to Beneavin Convalesent Home have been 228 during the year.

The following legacies have been received, viz.:—£1,000 from the late John Gilbert King, D.L., of King's County; £50 from the late Robert Williamson, who died in 1888, the same to be payable on the death of his wife; and £100 from the late Nicholas Lynch, who was a member of the Managing Committee for over twenty years, and had taken an active interest in the welfare of the Hospital; also, an equal share with others in the Residuary Estate of the late Captain Leslie, of the County Cavan. It is to be desired that other well-wishers will remember the Hospital when making their wills.

The demand for trained fever Nurses, both for private cases and for the Poor Law Unions, has increased to such an extent that in order to supply the needs of the country, the Managing Committee find it will be necessary to increase their staff of Nurses, and to enlarge and improve the accommodation for them. They have succeeded in acquiring a suitable site in Cork Street, adjacent to the Hospital, and have determined to erect thereon a properly equipped house as a Nurses' Home, allocating the Weir legacy to this purpose, and they propose to associate the name of the late Mr. James Weir with the building. Plans have been procured, and it is in contemplation without further delay to carry out this project, which they think is in harmony with the

objects of the Institution, and will be approved of by its friends and supporters. As constructing this Home will cost more than the whole amount of the Weir legacy, the Managing Committee earnestly appeal to the public for funds to finish and furnish it.

On account of the serious increase in the admissions of diphtheria, 123 cases of which were admitted during the past year, the Managing Committee have thought it right to appoint a Bacteriologist as an addition to the regular staff of the Hospital, and they lately elected Dr. Arthur White, Professor of Pathology in the Royal College of Surgeons, to that position.

At the last Annual General Meeting, Mr. Adam Lloyd Blood was elected a member of the Managing Committee. Dr. Jubb's term of office as Assistant Resident Officer having expired, Dr. John H. O'Connell was appointed in his place. Miss Weddall having resigned her position as Assistant Lady Superintendent, Miss Martha Isabella McRae was appointed to succeed her.

The Managing Committee have to record with regret the death of Miss Sarah Gilligan, who for sixty years had faithfully served the Hospital in the Laundry Department.

The Hospital was visited during the year by the Board of Superintendence of Dublin Hospitals, a Committee of the Dublin Hospital Sunday Fund, and by a Deputation from the Committee of City Hospitals of the Dublin Corporation, all of whom expressed themselves well pleased with the state of the Hospital. The Corporation Committee reported as follows:—

"The Hospital is well-kept, cleanliness and economy are marked features of this Hospital. The Committee are anxious to record their high appreciation of the excellent work done. The Committee were shown over the Hospital by Miss Rae and Dr. Day."

The Board of Superintendence reported as follows :-

"February, 1901.—The Board of Superintendence inspected the Hospital on this day, and were greatly pleased with the improvements which have been carried out since the last inspection."

The Managing Committee also desire to record their appreciation of the diligent and self-sacrificing attention to the spiritual welfare of the patients by the Clergy of the various denominations of St. Catherine's Parish. The Managing Committee, in drawing attention to the gifts received by them for the use and amusement of the patients, a list of which is annexed to the Report, notice with gratitude the large increase of such from their friends, and trust to a kind continuance of same; they also gratefully acknowledge the sum of £12 10s., which appears in the list of donations from the Carol Singers and their friends; also a hive of bees for Beneavin from Miss B. O Brien.

Miss Carson Rae, the Lady Superintendent, will gladly receive and acknowledge gifts of clothing for patients leaving the Hospital, as well as fruit, cut flowers, toys and books, for the use of the patients. Illustrated newspapers of any date are always acceptable, and may either be sent to the Hospital or be placed in the pillar receiving boxes at Westland Row and Harcourt Street Railway Stations.

TABLE No. I. gives the general statistics for the year ending March 31st, 1901:—

The total number of admissions to the Hospital during the year was 1,769. The corresponding numbers in the previous five years were:—

It will be seen the Total this year was 739 less than the number admitted in the previous year. The number admitted in 1899-1900 was however phenomenally high, having only once been exceeded in the ninety-eight-year-long history of the Hospital.

The daily average of beds occupied was 130.83, rising to 161.10 in November, and falling to 103.9 in May and June.

Owing to the outbreak of Small-pox in Glasgow, apprehensions were entertained that the Disease might be imported into Dublin, and so wards were set apart and kept in readiness, that cases might be promptly received and isolated. Several suspected cases, which proved however to be aggravated Chicken-pox, were sent in, and were detained in the special wards until their nature was made clear, when they were at once transferred to another building.

The number of cases admitted into Beneavin was 228, of these 168 were received from the Hospital, and 60 were private cases. The numbers last year were 278, 232 being from the Hospital and 46 private cases. This slight falling off is due to gradual diminution in prevalence of Scarlatina.

The Statistical Tables, which give the medical history for the year, have as usual been compiled by the Registrar, Dr. Day, who has spared no pains in making them comprehensive and accurate.

The death rate for the year was 8.32, deducting those cases sent in in a hopeless condition, it was 6.16.

Table II. gives the actual and corrected death rates for the previous ten years.

The next, Table III., gives the Monthly Statement of Patients, for the Hospital and for Beneavin.

Of the following tables, Table IV. gives an analysis of the various streets and localities from which patients came; they are classified according to the number of cases they contributed; the city and country cases being kept separate.

Table V. deals with the number of cases of the principal diseases which came under treatment, and the number of fatal cases; it deals with month periods.

To it is appended a list of the other diseases, cases of which were admitted. A glance at this list will show how heavy is the responsibility of diagnosing doubtful and ill-marked cases, and the importance, in all cases of uncertainty, of giving the other patients the benefit of the doubt, by keeping all cases isolated until the diagnosis is certain, rather than running the slightest risk of introducing a fresh infection into a ward. That most of these cases are other than those usually received into a Fever Hospital

speaks well for the confidence which the medical men and citizens of Dublin repose in the Hospital. This confidence is a great protection to the public health, as often to keep cases in crowded tenement houses until a certain diagnosis can be made, will seriously risk the spread of the disease, if it proves to be infectious. It is far better for a number of cases not finally classed amongst "fevers," to be admitted, than to have infectious cases left where they may become fresh foci of the disease.

That the Hospital has the confidence of the managers and medical officers of public institutions will be seen by Table V.

Table VI. deals with one of the most painful phases of hospital work, the reception of cases sent in in a hopeless condition. The number is not so large this year as it was in the previous year, when it reached the terrible total of seventy-three. Such cases must occur, but they occur far foo frequently, and, from delay, many curable cases end fatally.

Table VII. shows the deaths and their causes, grouped in monthly periods.

Table VIII. Groups the admissions in monthly periods of Typhus, Enteric, and Simple Fever.

Table IX. deals with Enteric Fever.

The number of Cases admitted was 208, a reduction of 195 from the unusually high figures of the previous year; again July, August, and September had the largest number of Cases. As usual the death rate was low: 7.22 per cent.

Table X. deals with Pneumonia.

It will be seen that 178 cases were admitted—almost exactly the number of cases (176) in the previous year. The cases were more evenly distributed than usual over the year, the largest number of admittances being in June, July, September, October, November, January, and February. There were 21 deaths, as contrasted with 30 in the previous year.

Table XI. shows number admitted and died of Erysipelas.

Table XII. deals with Scarlatina.

During the year the epidemic declined still further, the total admissions being 277, as contrasted with 323 in the previous year, and 430 in 1898-99. There was a recrudescence in October and November, the admissions running up to 40 and 32 respectively, the average for the last three months of the hospital year—January-March—was 18. There were only 9 deaths, showing the low mortality of 3.22 per cent.

Table XIII. deals with Measles.

It will be seen that the epidemic which raged in the preceding year, practically died out in this, there being only 56 admissions as contrasted with 879. As usually occurs in the end of an epidemic, the cases were mild, only one ending fatally.

Table XIV. deals with Diphtheria.

There was no sign of diminution of Diphtheria, indeed there was a slight increase, 123 cases having come under treatment, as compared with 119 in the previous year. There were 21 deaths, giving a death-rate of 17 per cent., as compared with 11.76 per cent. in the previous year; of the 21 who died, 8 were sent in in a hopeless state, generally having been kept at home until urgent symptoms supervened, and this remissness was shown in more than the fatal cases, as, in at least two recoveries, Tracheotomy had to be performed within a few minutes of admission.

The admissions for Diphtheria during the last eleven years has been steadily increasing as the following table will show:—

Tracheotomy was performed in 13 cases, of these 8 recovered. Antitoxin was used in all cases, the first injection generally consisted of 2,000 units. In all cases swabs from the throat were sent to the Pathologist to cultivate. Before discharge the throats were again swabbed, and the patients were not discharged until the Pathologist reported absence of the specific organisms.

The epidemic of Rötheln commenced in July with 31 cases, reaching its highest point in November, when 59 cases were admitted. The average for the last three months of the Hospital

year was 27, so this epidemic has been handed on to the current year. The outbreak, although widespread, was of a very mild type, and there were no deaths amongst the 253 cases treated.

There were 12 cases of Cerebro-Spinal Meningitis; of these 10 occurred in July, showing its epidemic character. Seven cases ended fatally.

There were 13 cases of Meningitis; the 10 which ended fatally were Tubercular.

The number of cases of Whooping Cough rose from 41 in the previous year to 94 in this.

The co-existence of several Epidemics—and especially of Measles, Rötheln and Scarlatina—taxed the capabilities of the Observation Wards; the building of the new Nurses' Home will however set free rooms, which, if made into additional Observation Wards, will prevent a recurrence of this difficulty.

The appointment of a Pathologist to the Hospital has been a great boon to the Visiting Staff, and Dr. White's valuable assistance has been largely utilised. Examinations for Diphtheritic and other Bacilli, for serum reaction in Enteric Fever, and Examinations of Blood, Urine, etc., have greatly helped accuracy of Diagnosis in ill-marked and complicated cases.

The Visiting Staff desire once again to place on record their gratitude to the Resident Physician, Dr. John Marshall Day, for the ability and care with which he has looked after the patients, a task in which he was well seconded by the Assistant Resident Medical Officer, Dr. John O'Connell. The Nursing of the Hospital has been carefully and efficiently carried out by a large Staff of Nurses, under the able supervision of the Lady Superintendent, Miss Carson Rae.

During the year no accident happened within the Hospital precincts, nor did anything occur to call for public comment or inquiry.


